<ul> <li>To identify similarities and differences between old toys and new toys</li> <li>To speak about how they found out about old toys and new toys.</li> </ul>	Show old and new toys of a similar type e.g. two bears What is the same and what is different about them? Draw attention to design, materials, and how toys move as well as what they look like. Ask children to draw a picture of the toy and label it. Represent ideas in a Venn diagram.
